## A Clean City is Important Your Safety is More Important

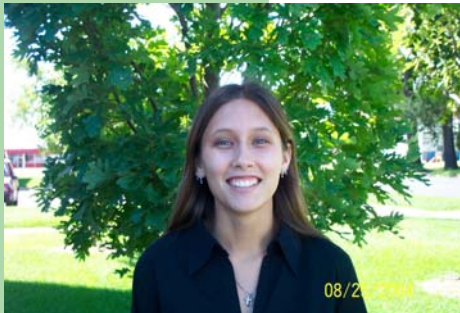
The Rural Road Fall trash walk is coming up! We will be assigning over 200 miles of roadside to numerous organizations. We need to inform all of our participants of important safety issues for these walks because safety comes first! Here are some nation facts along with some safety concerns.

Roadside litter still to this day is a multimillion-dollar problem in every state. Aside from financial concerns, roadside trash can create environmental damage and becomes a major safety issue for the state workers, volunteers, and inmates who have to walk alongside busy highways to clean it up.

The people doing the cleanups should avoid potentially dangerous/hazardous materials or any object found in the right-of-way that appears to be of questionable nature. Such items include dead batteries, animal carcasses, syringes, and any containers with unknown substances.

Recently, the Minnesota Department of Transportation told volunteers that help with cleanups that cigarette butts are ok, soda cans are not a problem and they shouldn't worry about food wrappers. But don't mess with coffee filters! The reason why they are telling volunteers this is because of safety issues with cleanups. They discovered coffee filters are often used in the illicit production of methamphetamines and may remain tainted with deadly chemicals after they're tossed aside. The growth of meth labs are a problem in rural areas. Some labs are in cars and the people leave contaminated items behind. If any volunteers run across meth lab evidence such as ammonia or propane tanks during their cleanup they are advised to contact the police. Many people probably wouldn't even think twice about not picking up a coffee filter because it seems like a very harmful item to individuals, so if you or anyone you know is going to do a cleanup it is always a good idea to check out safety issues first and make sure you have the necessary safety vests, boots, gloves, goggles, etc. to help prevent injuries among yourself and others in the group.

We look forward to working with all of our organizations this fall and we appreciate everything they do to make our roadsides look clean.

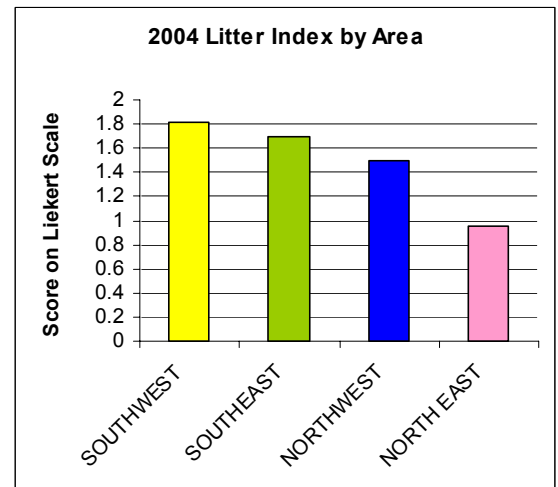

## Litter Index Down Again!

The Litter Index was down again for the 4th year in a row! KNPLCB began utilizing the Litter Index in June of 2000 to measure the amount of litter in the community. The Litter Index uses a 4 point Leikert Scale to measure litter. A score of 4 is Extremely Littered and a score of 1 is No Litter. North Platte scored a 1.49.

The Litter Index route is the same year after year to provide numbers with meaning. If you are interested in signing up to be a Litter Index judge, please call the KNPLCB offices. The Litter Index is held each June.

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS include pesticides, herbicides, flammables, paints & paint thinners, used oil, antifreeze, household cleaning chemicals, batteries, mercury, and computers (\$5.00 charge per monitor). Tires will also be accepted free of charge until 300 ton maximum is met.

Materials should be delivered to the site in a sturdy, disposable containers labeled according to the contents and no larger than 5 gallon or 50 lbs. KNPLCB reserves the right to reject any materials.
